

MIA'S MESSAGE





HEALTHY WHEATBELT: HOSPITAL UPGRADES COMPLETE

Upgrades to Merredin and Mukinbudin health services have been completed as part of the \$600m Royalties for Regions Southern Inland Health Initiative invested by The Nationals WA while in Government.

\$23.6m in Merredin has delivered a new emergency department, ambulatory care building, refurbished palliative care suite and patient lounge, medical imaging and decontamination unit. Administration and staff office accommodation has been renovated, along with the kitchen, dining room and laundry facilities and improvements have been made to link-ways, the car park and grounds.

The town of Mukinbudin previously had an outdated nursing post, and now have a \$3.302m purpose built facility. The new building will serve the community for many years to come and I congratulate the Shire and local health advocacy group for their work over many years to secure the project.

I am proud to have been part of the team that committed funding for the State's single biggest investment into regional health care in WA history – we understand that a lack of access to reasonable health services is a deal-breaker when it comes to living in regional WA.

GRAIN ON RAIL

The finalisation of the arbitration between CBH and Arc Infrastructure for access to the rail network is welcome after such a long period of uncertainty, but the matter of tier 3 lines is still a real concern when it comes to community safety, road funding and maintenance. We believe if Government partnered with industry to invest the capital then there may be an opportunity to reduce the overall cost and make them economical for future use. We have called on the Government to develop a business case to see if this is a possibility. If it isn't then we need an increase in funding for our road network. If Labor can find over \$4 billion for Metronet and subsidise public transport by \$1 billion a year, then they can certainly find money to ensure our agricultural sector has an efficient and safe transport network.

FIELD DAY SEASON

The field day season was a busy one, and a great opportunity for me to be out and about in the electorate catching up with everyone. At the Dowerin Field Days I joined with the community to celebrate the life memberships awarded to John Metcalf and Wal Fairlie – both long-term volunteers deserving of this recognition. VOLUNTARY ASSISTED DYING

I supported the Voluntary Assisted Dying Bill 2019 through the Legislative Assembly earlier this year. Having considered the issue carefully, seeking out the views of my electorate and weighing the information gathered and dissected in the Select Committee created to inform the debate, I reached the conclusion that I couldn't in good conscience deny this option to those that need it. I believe providing a choice to go gently and peacefully under your own terms is compassionate and just when there is no longer any relief from the ravages of disease and death is imminent.



PALLIATIVE CARE A PRIORITY

As the Parliament progresses the debate on voluntary assisted dying, there has been a welcome spotlight on palliative care. It has been clear for some time that these services have been chronically underfunded in WA, especially in regional areas of the State and The Nationals WA have cautiously welcomed Government announcements of additional funding to address this. However, WA's leading palliative care specialists estimate \$100 million is needed to ensure every West Australian has access to services and the Government's investment still falls well short of that mark. I hosted forums in Northam and Boddington earlier in the year to discuss this issue, in addition to aged care services in the electorate. I thank everyone that has signed our petition collecting support for increasing funding for palliative care services – every voice helps.

NO ACTION ON ANIMAL ACTIVISTS

The McGowan Labor Government has dragged its heels on introducing legislation to deal with illegal animal activists – despite being aware of the threats since the beginning of the year. More than ten months since these attacks by criminal activists began – attacks which have expanded from farms to cafes, restaurants, supermarkets and even schools – there has been no action despite repeated questions from The Nationals MPs in Parliament to the Attorney General, Police Minister, Agriculture Minister and Premier. In contrast, the Federal Liberal-National Government has introduced legislation making it a criminal offence for activists to incite illegal activity online with a five year imprisonment penalty, and NSW has ramped up penalties as well.

WIDE LOAD

Over the past few months The Nationals WA heard many complaints about the curfews and rules for the movement of oversized agricultural vehicles. As a result, we sought briefings from the Government and asked a number of questions to the Minister for Transport. The Government has since announced revised rules with the curfew being lifted on all except Perth metropolitan roads and 11 major regional transport routes. The curfew will apply to agricultural vehicles above 5.5 metres in width.

BACK IN THE POOL

We were horrified to learn that the McGowan Government had cut VacSwim classes this year without consultation or consideration for families that would have to make 100km or longer round trips to neighbouring towns. I raised the matter in Parliament after a wave of protest from families and local governments, and after further pressure the Minister was forced to reconsider the decision. A December program was reinstated for Beverley, Brookton, Kellerberrin, Koorda, Nungarin and Quairading in the Central Wheatbelt.

POLICE NUMBERS DOWN

The Nationals WA are concerned the safety of communities across the State has been jeopardised by the McGowan Government's failure to provide enough regional police officers. Questioning by The Nationals WA spokesperson for Police and Road Safety Hon Martin Aldridge MLC has revealed there are 95 unfilled positions in rural police districts. It is unacceptable that the Minister for Police hasn't ensured the regions have their full quota of officers. Rural areas aren't getting the police cover they deserve and considering the concerns in particular areas about rural crime, illicit drugs and traffic enforcement these Police shortages are not assisting. As of October, the Wheatbelt was down 18.25 full-time officers from the WA Police Force's own authorised staffing requirements.
